EXCHANGE PROGRAM – MOVILITY PROGRAM

• **NON MERCOSUR TRANSITIONAL RESIDENCE (Residence permit)**

Student visa is not required before leaving your country.

If you are **native of one of the following countries** you **must apply for a NON MERCOSUR TRANSITIONAL RESIDENCE**, in NON MERCOSUR Procedure Administration, Direction of Settling, the National Direction of Immigration (Dirección Nacional de Migraciones: Av. Antártida Argentina 1355 Buenos Aires) within 30 days from your registration at **Universidad de Belgrano**.

For the purpose of regularizing their migration status, international students must accompany a series of personal documents common to all types of procedures and, in addition, documents proving the adapting of each migrant to the admission criteria which are applying for residence.

For a one-semester exchange (up to 6 months), you'll need:

- Your Passport (original)
- A full set of copies of your passport including blank pages
- Two 4x4 color photos
- Registration certificate issued by **Universidad de Belgrano** (the length of your courses must be shown!)
- Certificate of argentine criminal records: Issued by the National Registry of Reoffend (Registro Nacional de Reincidencia: Piedras 115). It costs \$ 30 (thirty pesos) but there are other more expensive options if you want to obtain the certificate faster.
- ENTRY: Country entry seal stamped to a travel document or migration card.

Settling tax: TRANSITIONAL \$ 300 (three hundred pesos)

For a two-semester exchange (up to 12 months), you'll need:

- Your Passport (original)
- A full set of copies of your passport including blank pages
- Two 4x4 color photos
- Registration certificate issued by **Universidad de Belgrano** (the length of your courses must be shown!)
- Certificate of argentine criminal records: Issued by the National Registry of Reoffend (Registro Nacional de Reincidencia: Piedras 115). It costs \$ 30 (thirty pesos). There are other more expensive options if you want to obtain the certificate faster.
- Certificate of lack of criminal records: issued by the competent authorities of the countries where they have resided for a period exceeding ONE (1) year, during the course of the last THREE (3) years.
- AFFIDAVIT of lack of criminal record in other countries (it will be produce in migration at the time of application for residence).
- ENTRY: Country entry seal stamped to a travel document or migration card.

Settling tax: TRANSITIONAL \$ 300 (three hundred pesos)

DOUBLE DEGREE PROGRAM

• NON MERCOSUR TEMPORARY RESIDENCE

International students **must apply for a NON MERCOSUR TEMPORARY RESIDENCE**, in NON MERCOSUR Procedure Administration, Direction of Settling, the National Direction of Immigration (Dirección Nacional de Migraciones: Av. Antártida Argentina 1355 Buenos Aires) within 30 days from your registration at **Universidad de Belgrano**.

DOCUMENTS TO SUBMIT:

- Your Passport (original)
- A full set of copies of your passport including blank pages
- Two 4x4 color photos
- Registration certificate issued by **Universidad de Belgrano** (the length of your courses must be shown!)
- Birth certificate: must have the legalization of the Argentine Consulate, located in the country issuing the document Ministry of Foreign Affairs, International Trade and Worship, or Apostille, if the country has ratified the Hague Convention
- Certificate of argentine criminal records: Issued by the National Registry of Reoffend (Registro Nacional de Reincidencia: Piedras 115). It costs \$ 30 (thirty pesos). There are other more expensive options if you want to obtain the certificate faster.
- Certificate of lack of criminal records: issued by the competent authorities of the countries where they have resided for a period exceeding ONE (1) year, during the course of the last THREE (3) years.
- Affidavit of lack of criminal record in other countries (it will be produce in migration at the time of application for residence).
- Certificate of Domicile issued by the Argentinian Federal Police (Policia Federal Argentina)
- Entry: Country entry seal stamped to a travel document or migration card.

Settling tax: TEMPORARY \$ 600 (six hundred pesos)

IMPORTANT:

*All documents issued abroad must have the legalization of the Argentine Consulate, located in the country issuing the document Ministry of Foreign Affairs, International Trade and Worship, or Apostille, if the country has ratified the Hague Convention .

*Without detriment of that established on international agreements or conventions in force, any documents issued by consular representatives in the national territory must have the legalization of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, International Trade and Worship, except MERCOSUR.

*All documents issued in a foreign language must have the Spanish translation made by National Public Translator and legalized by the Translators' Association (Colegio de traductores públicos de la ciudad de Buenos Aires – Av. Corrientes 1834).

*The documents submitted should be original and be accompanied by their respective copy, in order to proceed to their certification. The National Direction of Migration may require, if deemed necessary, additional documentation to those detailed before.

• **Visa**

If your country is not in the previous list you must apply for a VISA before leaving your country.

You can obtain a visa through the Argentine consulate in the country of your place of residence.
